Never respond to the e-mail you received or click any links within the e-mail.



State News Syllabus

Heidi Evans, NCTM State Syllabus Chair



We're up to our ears in musicianship skills and *almost* memorized repertoire, so spring must be around the corner!

Encourage your students to improvise a little on the musicianship skills to keep interest levels high (broken chords, fun rhythms, etc.) or to write them out on staff paper. Send me your ideas for keeping students engaged with skills and I'll collate them together for a future *Music News* article! E-mail me at heidievanspiano@gmail.com, and I'll include your name unless requested otherwise and your idea(s). I hope to publish these ideas in September 2019.

March Reminders (these change monthly for relevance):

- Treat chairmen and adjudicators with respect and professionalism.
- No makeups/rescheduling of exams—this is too great of a burden on the volunteers who run the program.
 The student can always participate in the next season, or the teacher can join (pay dues and volunteer) another district with later dates.
- No photocopies—music must be legally procured downloads, presented in binders with proof of purchase, or original sheet music (books).
- Teachers are REQUIRED to be present for all Syllabus exams. In extreme circumstances, contact the district or state chairman for advice.
- Repertoire must match the level being tested with only one piece being one level lower; all others must meet or exceed the level being tested. Direct questions to the Syllabus Repertoire Committee of Ellen McQuilkin, Geneva Wright, Liz Willis, Carol Ratzlaf, or Heidi Evans.

- Do not register students for exams with the expectation that they will fail. Determining Level and preparation is the teacher's responsibility. If the student is not prepared, the exam can be changed from Evaluation to Demonstration or Creative Audition on the day of the exams. This is the teacher's choice, not the parent's choice. Forcing an adjudicator to fail students puts everyone in a difficult position.

A Tribute to Tiffany Jefferson of Lincoln County District

The Lincoln County members are saddened by the loss of our recent President, Tiffany Jefferson. She was a dynamic and organized President. Some of her contributions include being one of the first of the Nellie Tholen Fellows, she specialized in teaching Spanish speaking students, worked with Sarah Barker Ball on the Ribbon Festival and eventually took over that responsibility, participated in Spotlight Concerts and was beloved by all who knew her.

Here is what her teacher, Matt Goodrich wrote about Tiffany:

Tiffany was a wonderful piano student. She was so motivated to learn and improve for her own playing enjoyment as well as to serve her large teaching studio. She was fascinated by our lessons and repeatedly expressed gratitude for all that she was able to pass on to her students. I was inspired that she wanted to walk alongside them by going through the Syllabus examination process and seeking out performing opportunities to expand her abilities. Her improvement was dramatic because of her diligence. Our lessons often ran a couple of hours because it was so interesting to talk with her about her life and the cultural fabric of the Oregon Coast. We also shared a love of cats, and last fall she generously offered to take care of my ailing old feline over both Thanksgiving and Christmas so I could spend the holidays out of town with my family. I always enjoyed when we arranged to have lessons at her red Toledo farmhouse. There was such life there, with the piano right by the kitchen, chickens by the door, roosters crowing, and her daughter Carlyn—whose musical talent made Tiffany so proud—and the rest of the family going in and out. Hers was a life all too short, but beautifully lived. I am honored to have been a small part of it these last few years.

Every member of our group endorses the above. We miss her greatly.

ESMAR Students Prepare for Spring Assessment and Recital

Individual assessments/master classes with Dr. Jill Timmons are scheduled for April 27 (AM) and May 2 (PM) at Classic Pianos. The students will also present a joint recital on Sunday, May 19, which is also at Classic Pianos. This recital is open to the public, and interested teachers and students are especially invited.

ESMAR is in its ninth year. In addition to repertoire, the program offers advanced students an opportunity to learn new musicianship skills that haven't previously been offered in our Syllabus program. They include reading from a lead line, some basic improvisation, playing by ear, an exciting scale routine, and an arpeggio routine which includes familiar chords as well as chords that are new to students. A community service project is also part of the program. ESMAR appeals to future music majors as well as to those majoring in a different discipline.

As a participant from 2018, I can safely say that ESMAR is a great opportunity to take your musicianship to the next level. The rigorous, year-long curriculum not only introduced me to new repertoire and advanced musicianship skills, but also strengthened my knowledge of music history and the styles of individual composers. ESMAR has also introduced me to a network of incredibly talented fellow students and professionals, and is actually how I met my current piano mentor in Seattle, WA! I'm now continuing to play piano through college, while pursuing a major in engineering at the University of Washington.



The Eugene District was treated to an insightful presentation on February 11, given by Dr. Johnandrew Slominski titled, Classical Music on the Spot: The Training of an Eighteenth-Century Musician. In his presentation, Dr. Slominski presented the history of classical improvisation through demonstrating the teaching techniques of Mozart as well as giving examples of ways CPE Bach improvised. He encouraged us to included classical style improvisation with helpful activities that we can pass on to our students. A highlight of the presentation was listening to him play, as well as his witty sense of humor.

Our District held the first student event of 2019, the Baroque Festival, on February 9. Thirteen teachers and thirty-six students ranging in age from eight to eighteen participated in the event. At our meeting on March 11, we will have teachers from our District present on *Creating a Methodology for Mastering Sight-Reading*. Our Vice President, Dr. Janet Pollack, has been collating information from our teachers to present at our next meeting. The month of March will also include the Eugene OMTA District Recital which is a recital that many students use as a practice performance for Syllabus.

In our February meeting, Dr. Johnandrew Slominski, Assistant Professor of Piano and Theory at Linfield College, presented

a workshop titled Acquiring Aural Skills: Listening Deeply.

Looking forward to April, Portland District will host our annual Trula Whelan Concerto Festival for piano and string students. This year we are requiring all students to play with an accompanist for the festival. The goal of this format change is to encourage the student to learn a concerto movement with the orchestral parts and to receive all the educational benefits they can potentially gain from pursuing this very worthy endeavor. It also provides an opportunity for the student to perform their concerto with an accompanist before an adjudicator and receive a ten minute masterclass. We are very glad to have Karey Miles as the new chairperson of this long-standing event in our District.
