PRESIDENT'S CORNER

Flexibility, patience, and openmindedness. These are all characteristics that are vital for us as teachers. As Karen Thickstun pointed out in her presentation at our June conference, we need to meet our student's needs and wants rather than our own. I've had to be much more flexible and open to the increased absences for long trips of many of my student's families which has definitely affected my student's overall progress and their readiness for Fall Syllabus.

Consider how our methodology has been altered by the pandemic. While we are grateful for the amazing potential that Zoom, FaceTime and other platforms offered everyone during the last few years, the switch to internet dependency was not without a downside. Return to what was "normal" business and society may not be as easy or instant as many expected. It takes patience to accept lower attendance at meetings and other group activities as we wait for everyone to reschedule their lives.

The effects of the past two and a half years on our students are beginning to be understood in many areas. Some beginning students may not have progressed in some key areas such as reading, which means adjusting the level of material that we present at their lessons. Intermediate and advanced students are out of practice with public performance. They may also be experiencing increased pressures at school, meaning that Demonstrations or Auditions may be a more realistic avenue for their syllabus participation this fall. I've had to be flexible with my expectations.

Many students will experience in-person syllabus for the first time this year, even though they have already taken two levels—online.



The same might be true for some of our newer members, presenting students or hosting syllabus for the first time "in person" even if they have participated online the past several years.

Flexibility, patience, and open-mindedness will serve us well as we transition back into pre-pandemic mode for our festivals and syllabus events. We can all welcome OMTA's upcoming Fall events while expecting and accepting possible adjustments and accommodations.

Did you know that you can access records of your studio's Syllabus participation? Since the year that your district adopted the use of Leggiero for its Syllabus program—for many as far back as 2012— those records are available to you! It's very easy:

- Log in to Leggiero: https://omta.leggierosw.com
- Click on "ARCHIVES" on the left-hand side (below "SYLLABUS").
- Choose the year and click "Submit." A Teacher/Student Participation Report will appear with the events your studio participated in from the year you selected until present day, including the students' names, ages, and the result (Successful Evaluation, etc). You can even print it out as a PDF.
- If instead you want to know about a single event, for example, 2020 Spring Syllabus— Portland, click on it and you will find your original Teacher Registration Summary, listing all your students, the pieces each one played, and a listing of all the fees you paid. You can also print the Registration Summary for this event.

This information can be so helpful and easy to access! Leggiero has made our lives so much easier in registering students for Syllabus, Festivals, and other events, and also for accessing records. Each time you use Leggiero, you can send a silent thank you to Ramona and Jeff Goddard who developed this wonderful program for our use. It's amazing!

Dr. Crystal Zimmerman, NCTM

Albums for the Young: Fascinating but Lesser-Known Repertoire Choices for the Intermediate Level Pianist

This lecture will explore fascinating but lesser-known repertoire choices for the intermediate level pianist. These compositions are similar to Robert Schumann's Album for the Young, Op. 68, ranging in length from one to three pages and technically accessible for the intermediate student. Dr. Zimmerman will discuss the

character pieces in the middle of the nineteenth century, around the time of Schumann, and the impetus behind the explosion of "Albums for the Young" during this time. She will play pieces from Schumann's Op. 68 and demonstrate comparable/alternate suitable works by other composers such as Mosonyi, Kullak, Heller, Gade, Godard, Karganov, Kiel, Köhler, Kirchner, and Gurlitt. Many of the pieces have programmatic titles; it is this "character" element that can be a powerful creative stimulus for the student. Dr. Zimmerman has found that, for younger students especially, engaging the imagination in response to the images and emotions suggested by the title can create truly magical learning experiences.

The Eugene District held their second meeting of the year in-person on Monday, September 19 in Berwick Hall at the University of Oregon. The conference room in Berwick allowed for members to join virtually or in-person, a welcome opportunity for those who were unable to be there. The business meeting was brief but covered vital topics, and was efficiently run by our new president Nick Rieser. Discussion included membership categories that have become fuzzy following the removal of a college degree as a requirement for membership.

Following the meeting was an inspiring program by Dr. Lark Powers, assistant professor at Pacific Lutheran University, on *The Creativity of the Baroque Repertoire*. There was a good turnout, and the program was well received. Members commented on the program's breadth and depth of Baroque keyboard practices explored. Dr. Powers presented on how to find cadences, phrase lengths, sequences, imitation, key areas and more, all accompanied with recordings as illustrations. The implied metric pulse of select pieces was considered along with

appropriate stylized dances, and relevant historical tuning temperaments outlined. Through attention to these musical elements, it is hoped the student will be able to devise their own creative and historically informed interpretation. At a time when we encourage our students to be more than musically literate and technically proficient, Dr. Power's approach to creativity and historically informed practices is all the more relevant. Our members thank Dr. Grace Ho for setting up this wonderful program.

Our next meeting is Monday, November 14 at 9:00 am at the First Congregational Church in Eugene. It will be a Zoom presentation with an in-person gathering for viewing together. The presenter is Dr. Scott Price of South Carolina School of Music, who will speak on *Adaptive Teaching for Neurodiverse Students*. Dr. Price will offer ways to adapt pedagogy accordingly. IN MEMORIAM

Susan Marie Foust March 15, 1947-May 21, 2022

Susan Marie Foust, NCTM, passed away May 21, 2022, at her home in Beaverton. Susan was born March 15, 1947, in Portland, to Lyman and Vivian Rinker

Susan earned a degree in Psychology from Oregon State, and then a degree in Music Pedagogy from Marylhurst in 1984. She was an active OMTA member until she retired from teaching in 2020. Susan served as Portland District secretary, treasurer and syllabus chair, and created Portland District's first "Find a Teacher" resource. She was a technology leader in the early internet days and helped create the first Portland District website. As the district's first paid Syllabus support staff (together with LaRayne Rowland), Susan was instrumental in moving the Syllabus program into the information age. Susan was an Honorary Life Member of Portland District. Susan taught in her home studio in Beaverton, as well as at Concord Pianos in Hillsboro. Together with Donna Simmons and Susan Todd, she founded the Westside Recitals group in 1998. Patti Duthie reported that Susan was active in the Portland Alumnae chapter of Mu Phi Epsilon, serving as Steward for several terms.

Susan's students also enjoyed participating in National Federated Music Clubs Junior Festival





events. She was in the Sunset chapter of NFMC. Jan Mittelstaedt remembered taking a composition course from Sister Anne Cecile with Susan; that course inspired Susan and Jan to continue teaching composition. Susan's students participated in the OMTA Composition Celebration as well as Cascadia Composer's In Good Hands concerts.

The One More Time Around and the Beat Goes On marching bands were a source of joy for Susan as she played glockenspiel with them for many years, and she was in a performance group with many OMTA friends for over 25 years. Susan's interests and hobbies included astrology, crochet, Audubon Society, the General Society of Mayflower Descendants and serving as a board member at Unity of Beaverton Church.

As a yearly season ticket holder, she loved the Oregon Symphony, Portland Opera and Chamber Music Northwest, often attending with her dad Lyman or her concert buddy Rebecca Schappert. Throughout her life she was fiercely independent and very intelligent, and she continued learning by attending many seminars and conferences.

Survivors include brother and sister-in-law James and Willa Rinker, and nieces and nephews JoAnna, Robert, Avery and Beau Rinker.

Susan Foust will be remembered as a witty, curious, and steadfast friend, and will be missed.

A memorial service is planned for **Saturday**, **November 12**, **2022 at 2:00 pm**.
