SYLLABUS



Barbara Roberts, NCTM Syllabus Chair

Spring Syllabus is just around the corner! Most teachers are busy making sure their students are well-prepared. Below are a few things that have helped me in the past.

- Hold a "mock" Syllabus with each student 3-4 weeks before the exam. Do this during the lesson but before they've warmed up. Ask them all the technique questions and actually grade them with the rubric the adjudicator uses. This will tell you (and them) a lot about what still needs to be learned.
- Starting now, spend 5-10 minutes each lesson practicing sight reading. At first, use extremely easy examples. After students have their hands in position, ask them to count a measure "for free" before they begin. Make sure they keep counting! Kids who count out loud while sight reading have a much greater success rate than those who do not. And despite what anyone says, everyone can count out loud if the pieces are easy enough. Once they master the counting, increase the difficulty of the pieces.
- Practice rhythm reading! You can use old Syllabus exams or other rhythm reading books. The key is to count out loud!
- 2-4 weeks before Syllabus, hold small group recitals in which each student plays all their Syllabus pieces in front of the group in the same way (memorized or with music) that they will be playing them in the exam.

Always remember that a teacher can change a student's examination level (Evaluation, Demonstration, Audition) at any time before the beginning of the actual exam.

Good luck and enjoy the process!

Hearing, Sight, Touch, and Proprioception: Engaging the Four Senses of Piano Playing for Optimal Learning and Performing

We all long for ourselves and our students to learn music so well that we can perform with ease, grace, and command of ourselves and the instrument. It often feels like a mysterious, alchemical process to arrive there: how do we go from learning and struggling to real mastery? The answer lies in large part in the four senses we use when performing: hearing, sight, touch, and proprioception. All four of these senses must be engaged for stellar performances, but we often do not know how to make the best use of them or how to teach our students to do so. In this talk, Dr. Lewis will speak about how we must lead first and foremost with our hearing; how our eyes can be powerful allies or can make our practice and performance suffer; how touch and proprioception reinforce an intuitive and resilient connection between the musician and the instrument. He will discuss specific teaching and practice strategies to optimize how we use our senses. Dr. Lewis will also explore recent neuroscience research on how our brain processes sensory input and turns it into motor action and creative thought. Ultimately, this will help us better reach the place where we can feel empowered to perform creatively, boldly, and expressively.

Although it was a successful event, there were some problems with teachers not following the rules. We urge all participating studios in all districts to please read rules and requirements carefully and to follow them in the future.

Plans for our March 12 spring recital, to be chaired by Sarah Burch, are in the works, and a Contemporary Music Festival chaired by Lucy Clevenger is planned for April 16 at the United Lutheran Church of Eugene. Syllabus will take place on April 28-30; the Soule Scholarship auditions are scheduled for April 30; our district Composition Celebration will be held at Eugene's Broadway Metro and co-chaired by Paul Safar and Nick Rieser; and our Teachers' Showcase, an annual fundraising event, is planned for May 13.

In addition, our newly formed collegiate chapter will again sponsor the University of Oregon Piano Festival on Sunday, April 30, from 12:00 to 6:00 PM. Students can participate in one of two possible tracks: 1) performance only, or 2) performance and master class (available only to students level 8 and up). Our chapter met for a business meeting on Monday, January 9 at Grace Lutheran Church in Ashland, and this was followed by a presentation by OMTA President-Elect Heidi Evans, who spoke about Akiko and Forrest Kinney's *Pattern Play* series.



These books stress the importance of improvisation in developing a well-rounded musical education, and as a jazz pianist, I was naturally very interested in hearing Heidi's thoughts on how best to integrate the improvisational approaches described in the Pattern Play books into my students' lessons. Of course, describing the many benefits of these books is beyond the scope of this report, but I would mention the following: 1) Pattern Play offers students a new and spontaneous avenue to express their feelings (stormy, happy, etc.) at the piano, 2) it teaches musical skills in a creative fashion, 3) it introduces the notion of harmonic substitution as represented by the shifting chords in the accompaniment, 4) it teaches the importance of allowing a musical expression to breathe through the judicious use of rests, 5) it eventually allows the students to move from a duet format to a solo improvisation, 6) it causes them to consider the role



of each hand in constructing a melody or a harmony, and 7) it eventually makes clear the importance of intentionality in an improvisation, that is, of realizing an impromptu conception as opposed to simply wiggling the fingers.

Heidi encourages beginning each lesson with one (or more) of the *Pattern Play* improvisations, and her presentation has motivated all of us to try out these materials on our own students. I certainly have, and I am very grateful to her for her encouragement.

On Saturday, February 25, the Joyce Stevens Scholarship Benefit Recital was held at St. Mark's Episcopalian Church in Medford. The performers were Brian Hall, Michele Alspach, Alexander Tutunov, Pat Daly, Tiana Wong, Anna Christina Streletz, Iryna Kudielina, and Thor Polson (pictured from left to right in the photo), and the music included works by Bach, Scarlatti, Schubert, Liszt, Brahms, Saint-Saëns, Prokofiev, Gershwin, and Coltrane. This event is held annually to raise money for a scholarship awarded to local students who plan to major in music in college, and we were very pleased indeed to see over 140 people in the audience for the concert.



Dr. Alexander Tutunov will offer a master class at Grace Lutheran Church in Ashland on Saturday, February 25. (A full report on that event will appear in the next newsletter.) We also look forward to the Sonatina Festival on March 18 and 19 and to Dr. Lark Powers' presentation *Practice Smarter, Not Longer* in April, not to mention the statewide convention in Ashland this June.
