OMTA Certification is thrilled to share yet another remarkable achievement. **Dianne Davies**, who chairs our Composition Festival, is an exceptional musician, composer, and educator. Now she proudly holds the title of a Nationally Certified Teacher of Music. We take immense joy in commemorating this significant milestone with her.

Here are her reflections on this transformative journey:

Inspiration: When all the Syllabus exams shut down in the spring of 2020, the Syllabus committee graciously gave teachers the option to have a fellow teacher adjudicate even if they were not certified. So, when a friend asked me to give her students an online adjudication, I said "sure!" Then I had so much fun preparing, and enjoyed the actual adjudication process so much, that I felt stirred to finally pursue certification.

Teacher Profile Projects: First, I must say I learned so much from all five of the projects. Project four, entitled "Share Information about Your Teaching Environment", was personally encouraging. It allowed me to appreciate and document all the practice-incentive charts I have designed, the games I use for group classes, and the artwork in my studio. My favorite project was number three, called "Present Your Teaching". Recording three lessons with the same student and evaluating myself at the Introductory phase, Intermediate phase, and the Final phase, taught me so much about my own teaching style and pacing of each lesson. I think this project would be the most valuable for all of us pedagogues to consider on a regular basis. I record my own performances and evaluate them, but I never previously recorded my teaching and evaluated that. This was the most helpful and the most revealing project among the five.

SYLLABUS

Sign-ups are due soon for Fall Syllabus. Some reminders:

- Make sure to include all piece identification when registering for Syllabus. For example, Minuet by Bach or Sonata by Beethoven is not enough information for adjudicators, who need to look up pieces beforehand to check levels.
- Please make sure the printed music that will be given to the adjudicators includes measure numbers. If not, please write them in! When there are no measure numbers it is incredibly time-consuming and difficult for adjudicators to refer to specific measures in their comments.
- Consider signing up for Syllabus on Fridays. Weekends are the busiest and most soughtafter, so if Friday works for you, they are generally open and available!
- One teacher-adjudicator conference is required and is now included in your Leggiero registration. However, if you will have a long day and many students, you are encouraged to sign up for more than one teacher conference. You can also ask your District Chair to space them a certain way for example, one before lunch and another at the end of the day. You could also schedule two back-to-back at the end of the day.
- String Syllabus is now on Leggiero. If you know any string teachers who are already OMTA members or interested in becoming members, please encourage them to get involved!

The Eugene District had its second meeting of 2023 on Monday, October 9 in Berwick Hall on the University of Oregon campus. Our district has been extremely productive over the summer and early fall, researching ways to improve our website, expand our membership and devise monthly educational programs that best support our teachers' needs. As a result of this preliminary work, Alexis Gibbons, NCTM, and Nick Rieser were able to present a proposal to members at the first meeting that suggested migration of the current website to Squarespace. At the same meeting, Dr. Genevieve Mason welcomed two new members, Ayden Katteman and Siera Kaup, and Dr. Grace Ho arranged for us to use UO's keyboard lab for a hands -on workshop focused on improvisation.

The first of the monthly programs, *Play the Right Notes*—its title possibly a satirical play on the famous quote by jazz musician Thelonious Monk to the effect that there are no "wrong" notes—was presented by Nick Rieser and Paul Safar. The objective was to free teachers from the tyranny of the written note and to increase confidence in their ability to improvise. Specific tools and methods were demonstrated to enable teachers to encourage their own students to try their hands at improvisation. In addition to this excellent workshop, Dr. Grace Ho has put together a slate of exciting programs for the coming year. November 13 brings *The Story Behind the Notes* by pianist, composer, and educator Cyrus von Hochstetter, who promises to reveal the underlying fabric that is music in entertaining and revelatory ways. On January 22, we will have *Bringing Opera to Life Through Transcription* by the University of Oregon's new Associate Professor, Dr. Brian Hsu. This program is certain to dazzle and entertain with the remarkable Mozart/Liszt transcription *Reminiscences de Don Juan.* February's program will focus on pedagogical research, and in March there will be a workshop and master class by Deborah Rambo Sinn. Spotlight on the Teachers Benefit Concert: Classics You Love was presented by the Lincoln County District at the Newport Performing Arts Center on Sunday, September 17. Our first Spotlight Concert was held in 1999. We started out with just four pianists playing solos, duets, and piano quartets. Dr. Mary Lee Scoville, Suzanne Brown, Marcia Wilcox and Jessie Treon were the first performers. Later we started having recitals twice a year, including both group members and guests.

These concerts benefit the local district's scholarship fund, which was later named for Suzanne Brown. It is used to provide tuition for lessons, books, or festival fees for those students whose families cannot afford the full cost of music education. The family contributes what they can, teachers discount their fees, and the fund makes up the difference. The expenses involved in giving these concerts has increased over the years, and were it not for community support of these concerts, many students would not be able to continue in lessons. Performers in this program included OMTA members Cathy Champion-Predmore, NCTM, Ramona Goddard, Brandon Lucas, Christine McKenney, Jessie Treon, and Rita Warton. Guest performers include Charmaine Leclair, Gidget Manucci, and Carol Wolfe.

The fall version of the Spotlight Concerts Series was focused on the Classics. The piano quartet, composed of Treon, Champion-Predmore, Warton, and Wolfe, opened the concert with an arrangement of the *Sicilienne* from a Bach Sonata for Flute and Piano, a rich example of melody only Bach could achieve. The quartet closed the concert with *Brasileira*, an upbeat Latin dance from *Scaramouche*, composed by Darius Milhaud and arranged by Walden Hughes.

In between these bookends were works by Brahms, Schubert, and Tchaikovsky on piano. In addition, there were multiple vocal numbers. McKenney and Manucci performed *Sound the Trumpet* by Henry Purcell, accompanied by Treon. This is a classic example of Baroque music with counterpoint in the voices and piano. We welcomed back cellist Charmaine Leclair to our concert series, who performed, with Goddard on piano, two movements from the Sonata in D Minor for Cello and Piano by 20th-century composer Dmitri Shostakovich. Brandon Lucas sang and played two numbers from the Great American Songbook, *Cabaret* and *What the World* Needs Now by Bacharach and David. In addition, Lucas also played his own arrangement of Autumn Leaves and It Don't Mean a Thing if It Ain't Got That Swing.

"We are always amazed at the variety of these concerts," said Rita Warton. "This year's mix of piano, vocals, and string ensembles was no exception."

IN MEMORIAM: DOROTHY FAHLMAN

About 20 years ago, I was considering going back to school to earn a graduate degree, as I do not have one, and Dorothy was the first person I called for advice. "Liz," she said, "I never went for a graduate degree. I just attended every master class I could, and learned from all of those pianists." Needless to say, I did not feel I needed to ask anyone else for advice.

Dorothy Fahlman, NCTM, was a member of MTNA and OMTA for 60 years. At one point, she estimated that she had taught over 1,200 students individually. Many of her students went on to conservatories, studying with well-known pianists such as Leon Fleisher, Jon Kimura Parker, and Andre Watts. Her students participated in competitions often, and won state, national and international awards.

Dorothy's leadership roles within OMTA were many, including serving as state Syllabus chair, and as president for both the Portland District and the state. Dorothy was a sought-after adjudicator, speaker, and clinician for most states in the country. She was awarded the OMTA Nellie Tholen Excellence in Teaching Award in 2018. She also created and chaired a music exchange program of teachers, artists, and students between Khabarovsk, Russia and Portland, Oregon that lasted for years.

Dorothy was not only very generous to her OMTA colleagues with her time and expertise, she and her husband Clyde funded a scholarship to recognize the students who had worked diligently through the OMTA syllabus program—a program very close to Dorothy's heart.

In addition to her career as a piano teacher, she was a script writer, director and puppeteer. In association with Puppeteers of America and the Junior League of Portland, she was the co-creator of the children's musical "Wee Sing Together" and co-author of three children's musical story books. Dorothy also served many years on the board of Portland Piano International.



A recital of music and memories of Dorothy's students will take place Friday, November 3, 7:00 PM at Multnomah Presbyterian Church, 7555 SW 45th Ave, Portland.

Her memorial service will take place Saturday, November 4, 10:00 AM at St. John the Baptist Episcopal Parish, 6300 SW Nicol Road, Portland.

Rosanne Christensen Smith, fondly called Miss Rosanne by her many students, enjoyed a 52-year music career. She taught violin, viola, cello, and piano in St. Louis, Missouri and Anaheim, California before moving to Corvallis, Oregon.

A seasoned performer, Rosanne played in chamber orchestras in Austria, Germany, Italy, and Switzerland. For 37 years, she was a member of the Disneyland Candlelight Orchestra and also performed with the Pacific Symphony, Rio Hondo Symphony, and Fullerton Civic Light Opera.

Rosanne offered summer music camps, which featured music theory, master classes, solo recitals, and instruction about operas and ballets with original -artwork coloring books. Her students were regularly spotlighted at conventions and honors recitals. Rosanne was a pillar of the OMTA Linn-Benton district, serving as their president for seven years and contributing greatly to the overall vitality of the musical community of Corvallis.

Those who had the fortune to have Rosanne as a teacher or colleague consistently mentioned her love of life, sense of humor, and vibrant, fun personality.

To quote a tribute paid to her: "You have to admire someone who is chipper and raring to go at 7:30 AM while teaching Elementary Strings in Corvallis and then teaching string classes for Albany Youth Orchestra. She had enthusiasm and a good sense of humor. She brought discipline and ample verbal rewards to spark the kids. She will be missed by many."
