OMTA has recently been invited to become a sponsor of *On Deck With Young Musicians*, a weekly program of Portland's All Classical radio station, 89.9 FM. On Deck airs at 5:00 PM PST every Saturday. If you haven't listened to All Classical, you should definitely check it out. They have delightful hosts that give the most interesting tidbits of history about the music and composers you've been listening to. I learn something new every time I tune in. There is no news broadcast on All Classical—it is *all* music!

Over the years, a number of students of OMTA teachers have been interviewed for *On Deck*. The Executive Board unanimously voted to support All Classical, and a committee was charged with developing our message. Much appreciation to Jeremy Hatch for serving as chair, and Matt Cooper, DMA, Andy D'Antonio, NCTM, and Kristy Moore for their work on this project.

This evening will include solo piano works by J.S. Bach, Liszt, Mendelssohn, Schumann, and Duke Ellington, among others, as well as songs by Joni Mitchell, Paul Simon, Tracy Chapman, Connie Converse, Jerome Kern, and Gabriel Kahane. The performance will culminate in the Oregon premiere of "Final Privacy Song", a sprawling meditation on a climate crisis and surveillance, composed by the younger Kahane on a text by acclaimed poet Matthew Zapruder.

Master classes for Willamette University music students will be held on Friday, March 8th and Saturday, March 9th in the Rogers Music Center. On January 27, 2024, Oregon MusicLink hosted guest artist Ines Irawati for a benefit piano recital and master class. Ines delighted the 70-member audience with her exciting and exquisite performances of Beethoven's "Waldstein" Sonata, Ravel's *La Valse*, and Respighi's *Notturno*, as well as an encore improvisation on Mozart's *Rondo alla Turca*.

After the recital, Ines taught a very engaging master class featuring three aspiring Oregon pianists. Elena (age 16) performed Debussy's Arabesque No. 1, Adrian (age 17) performed the first moment of Mozart's Sonata in F, K 332, and Ava (age 14) performed the first movement of Kuhlau's Sonata in C, Op. 55, No. 6. In addition to his performance, MusicLink student Adrian gave a heartfelt speech before the audience about the many ways he has benefited from his music lessons. It was an inspiring event for all and raised funds and awareness about MusicLink in Oregon.

MusicLink matches students from low-income families with professional music teachers who are willing and able to offer lessons at a rate the families can afford. MusicLink supports the student by providing funding for sheet music and entry fees to performance events, summer music camp scholarships, help finding an instrument and more.

SYLLABUS

Spring Syllabus season is upon us and registrations are in full swing. Some reminders:

- Please double-check the repertoire for your students. Only one piece may be a level below the Syllabus Evaluation Level. If you are unsure about any levels of repertoire, log in to check the Repertoire Lists on the website (https://oregonmta.org/programs/syllabus/syllabus-manuals/). If you have further questions, contact any member of the Repertoire Committee, whose links are on the Syllabus Webpage (https://oregonmta.org/programs/syllabus/). This is especially important for all Level X students!
- Please send your checks in on time (even better, send them in early)!
- Teachers—if for some reason you are unable to attend your student's Syllabus exam, you must ask someone to monitor in your stead. Please let the host know, and exchange cell phone numbers with the host beforehand. This person will introduce each student to the adjudicator, be there for the entire exam, and help make sure everything goes smoothly.
- Don't forget to include measure numbers in the printed music given to the adjudicator.

First, teachers ordering trophies for their students should now contact: Lorraine Alner, NCTM, by phone at 503-828-4590 or by email at lyant@samford.edu.



Between the morning workshop and the afternoon Baroque Festival, we enjoyed socializing over lunch at a downtown La Grande restaurant.

On Monday, January 8, member Anna Christina Streletz delivered a presentation entitled *What Does It Take? How to Prepare for a Recital* at the First United Methodist Church in Medford. Anna Christina had just completed a grueling series of solo piano performances which culminated in a concert performed last November, so she was in an excellent position to elaborate on this particular subject. Her audience members were totally engaged as she described her background, her credentials, her reasons for choosing the life of a performing pianist, and her approaches to preparing herself for an upcoming performance.

Those approaches included logistical issues and particular considerations on the day of the given concert, among other things. Of particular interest was Anna Christina's long-term preparation timeline, beginning as early as eighteen months in advance of a performance, and her approach to pacing herself during that period. The subject of psychology was raised, and she brought up the following three points with respect to belief, faith, and trust:

- 1. Don't believe in your professed limits,
- 2. Don't allow the present circumstances to dictate outcomes; and,
- 3. Trust in your chosen process.

She concluded with a short discussion of various modes and sources of encouragement (e.g., family, friends, teachers, and mentors), pitfalls, and overall goals. As she put it so well: "in the end, the only failure is inaction."

On Saturday, January 20, Dr. Alexander Tutunov, NCTM, the head of keyboard studies at Southern Oregon University, offered a master class at Grace Lutheran Church in Ashland as part of the Nellie Tholen Grant Program. The following students played the following pieces:
