Two of our presenters will be **Dr. Leah Claiborne** and **Dr. Theresa Bogard**.

Dr. Leah Claiborne is an Assistant Professor of Music in the Division of Arts and Humanities in the College of Arts and Sciences at the University of the District of Columbia. Pianist, scholar, and educator, Dr. Claiborne promotes diversity in the arts by championing piano music by Black composers in her performances, research, and teaching. In 2017, Dr. Claiborne was the first pianist to be awarded the Rackham Predoc Fellowship at the University of Michigan, which allowed her to further her research in compiling, editing, and recording piano music by Black composers.

Dr. Theresa Bogard is renowned for her expertise in technique and engaging presentation style. Her early career focused on performances of music by women composers, and she continues to include works by other lesser-known composers in her varied programs. Internationally known as a pedagogue, she has been honored with numerous teaching

awards. She attracts students from around the world as professor of piano at the University of Wyoming, where she also served as chair of the music department from 2010 to 2016. In 2008, she was chosen as the Wyoming Professor of the Year by the Carnegie Foundation.

## Willamette University Grace Goudy Distinguished Artists Series 2024-25 Season presents

Angélica Negrón, composer and multi-instrumentalist Wednesday, November 6th<sup>th</sup>, 7:30 p.m. Hudson Concert Hall, Mary Stuart Rogers Music Center

"mesmerizing and affecting" (Feast of Music)



**Angélica Negrón** is a Puerto-Rican composer and multi-instrumentalist recognized for composing music for accordions, robotic instruments, toys, and electronics, as well as for chamber ensembles, orchestras, choirs, and films.

Her music has been described as "wistfully idiosyncratic and contemplative" (WQXR/Q2) while The New York Times noted her "capacity to surprise." Negrón has been commissioned by the

Bang on a Can All-Stars, Kronos Quartet, loadbang, MATA Festival, Brooklyn Youth Chorus, Sō Percussion, the American Composers Orchestra, and the New York Botanical Garden, among others. She has composed numerous film scores, including Landfall (2020) and Memories of a Penitent Heart (2016), in collaboration with filmmaker Cecilia Aldarondo. She was the recipient of the 2022 Hermitage Greenfield Prize. Upcoming premieres include works for the Seattle Symphony, LA Philharmonic, NY Philharmonic Project 19 initiative and multiple performances at Big Ears Festival 2022. Negrón continues to perform and compose for film. Angelica Negron

Angélica will give a lecture/question-answer presentation to the Willamette community on Tuesday, November 5th, 11:30 a.m. in the Rogers Music Center. All are invited to attend and observe. Admission is free.



**Dr. Ricardo de la Torre and Dr. Lark Powers** *Piano Methods from Around the World* 

Much has been written about the value, advantages, and disadvantages of piano method books for beginning students. However, few comparative studies on the methodology of different international approaches exist. The objective of this joint session is to present, discuss, and contrast piano methods at the beginning level from different pedagogical traditions by authors from France, Germany, Hungary, Cuba, and Japan. Elements discussed will include the approach to introducing note-reading, how technique is built, the structure of rhythmic exercises, and the introduction of general musicianship, as well as the use of fanciful elements that engage children. We will compare and contrast these approaches to ones used in English-speaking countries, particularly American piano methods. Teachers may find inspiration for teaching specific skills through the analysis of these method books, as well as gaining increased awareness of what texts are used worldwide, while enjoying a lively discussion of pedagogical merits and cultural values.

#### Dr. Michelle Huang

Creating Beautiful Tone in Piano Playing and The Art of Memorization

Morning Session: It is a lifelong challenge for pianists to make a beautiful cantabile sound on the piano, but it is possible through a general understanding of the mechanism of the instrument as well as the proper technique to make a warm, singing tone in piano playing. In this presentation, we will survey different ways to approach the

piano keys through two-note and three-note slurs, staccatos, tenutos, accents, octaves, chords, voicing, and phrase shaping. Through specific musical examples, we will learn that different composers and styles might require different techniques to bring out certain sounds. By exploring an array of key speeds and attacks, we can bring out exciting possibilities in how we vary our sound and musical ideas.

Afternoon Session: "I played through it without the music just fine before!" We have all been there. What makes someone a better memorizer than others? In this talk, we will look at the four different types of memory: visual, tactile, aural, and analytical, and how to best use them to securely memorize our pieces for the next performance. We will learn that there is a direct correlation between excellent practice habits and memory, and how the act of storytelling can really help to secure that memory.

How do we play Baroque music expressively, in a way that shows stylistic awareness, and yet in a way that accommodates the instrument being used? CPE Bach wrote, in his treatise on keyboard playing: "play from the Soul, not like a trained bird. Endeavor to avoid everything mechanical and slavish." We all know that a musical performance is much more than just realizing the notes on the page. But how do we find the meaning of what is being expressed in the notation of a musical composition, and bring that to life in our playing? Looking at keyboard repertoire from the Baroque, learn the basics of how to read beyond the notes in the score to better understand and present the character and personality of the music.

Hopefully you have already heard some buzz about a new virtual district in the works. What is Virtual District? Does it make sense for you to join? The origins of a virtual district come from North Carolina, the first state to spearhead this new format of MTNA local district. In their case, they created a virtual district to service a part of the state that was

rural and had no local districts. The district became so popular that they opened it up to anyone across the state.

In Oregon, the majority of our population lives in the Willamette Valley, specifically between Eugene and the Portland Metro area. We have many wonderful teachers who live outside this area, but are generally more spread out and often are located in rural communities. Like North Carolina, a virtual district in Oregon could be a way to unite members who might live far away from many other teachers, especially if a district is worried about the longevity of their local group.

Of course, a virtual district does not need to be limited to members in rural areas. Some teachers are unable to make the schedule of their local district work with their lives. Some teachers have students who are virtual and spread out, and they would like more virtual events for the students to participate in. And some teachers simply prefer a virtual format for themselves.

There are many reasons why a virtual district would be a great idea for Oregon. At this point, the structure of the district is very open-ended: ideas that have been suggested include virtual festivals, local in -person meetings, and virtual presentations, recruiting the best pedagogues from around the country. Ultimately, how a virtual district is operated will be decided by those who lead the district. And as a reminder, members are always allowed to join

multiple local districts. So if you wanted to remain in your current district, but also join the virtual district, that would be a great option.

In order for a virtual district to be successful, we need leaders. We have a volunteer for a secretary, but at the time of this writing we still need a treasurer, and a president or co-presidents. Does this idea interest you? No experience is necessary—just a willingness to learn and a passion for helping make our state a better place for music teachers. You will get lots of support from our other leaders! Please reach out to me or State President Heidi Evans, NCTM soon if you are interested in this—we would love to try to make this happen by the summer of 2025, which means we need to start getting everything in order now.

## FRANCES (RAGOZZINO) GEER MEMORIAL PIANO **SCHOLARSHIP**

## Available to Outstanding Seniors Bound for Music Study

From the estate of Frances (Ragozzino) Geer (1931-2021), OMTA has received a generous gift of \$15,000. Her children, (Kate Schafroth, Laurabeth Ragozzino, Matt Ragozzino, and Julie Ragozzino) provided the following biography:

Frances began studying piano in her early years under Mrs. Donna Eason of Salem, Oregon, and went on to complete her Bachelor's Degree in Music Performance at University of Oregon, where she served as President of Mu Phi Epsilon music fraternity. Her love of piano and teaching remained a central interest for her entire life. She taught piano for more than 20 years in Eugene, Oregon, and frequently served as an OMTA Syllabus adjudicator during that time. In the 1970s, Frances performed duo-piano concerts throughout the West Coast with her dear friend Patricia (Gabriel Nash) McAlister (1939 -2018) from their two-piano repertoire. Frances' longtime membership with OMTA was an association she was very proud of.

Frances moved to the Tigard/Tualatin area in 1979, and was then active in Tualatin Valley District. She

was active in her local chapter up until the end of her life, and beautifully combined her love of piano and hospitality by hosting many OMTA events and concerts in her lovely Sherwood home. It was a great joy for her to witness several of her grandchildren pursue music in their own lives. Above all, she had a deep passion



for helping promising young musicians have every opportunity to study, develop, and share their gifts.

The OMTA Scholarship Commission has approved establishing the Frances Ragozzino Geer Memorial Piano Scholarship, which will be available beginning in May 2025. The scholarship is open to high school seniors who plan to pursue music in college and have received a "Successful Evaluation" in either 2 lowerdivision and 3 upper-division Syllabus examinations, or all 4 upper-division Syllabus examinations. Level X must be completed "With Distinction." Details and the application form will be posted on the OMTA website on the Scholarships and Grants page (https://oregonmta.org/programs/scholarships) under Competitive Scholarships in early February.

## **SYLLABUS**

I would like to draw your attention to some important updates to our Syllabus program.

#### Level VI Awards and Recital

We will be offering a special honor to Syllabus students who have completed Level VI starting in Fall 2024. These students will be eligible to receive a medal and to play in the Level VI/X Recital in the spring. We are excited about this program! We hope it will give a boost to those Lower Division students who have worked so hard, and encourage them to continue on to Upper Division. This will apply to those students completing Level VI this fall (2024) and going forward—it is not retroactive. Students must have participated in a minimum of 4 Lower Division exams with any combination of Evaluation, Demonstration, or Audition. Effective immediately, fees will cover both shipping and part of the cost of the awards, so expect the amount to increase over last year. For the detailed requirements and further information, please consult the website for the Level VI Awards Form (https://oregonmta.org/wp-content/ uploads/Level-6-Awards-Form.pdf). The Level X Awards Form (https://oregonmta.org/wp-content/ uploads/Level-10-Awards-Form.pdf) has also been updated.

#### Classical Piano Syllabus Manual

We will be updating the Syllabus Manual sometime this year, with the hopes of using the new one starting in the fall of 2025. However, this year (Fall 2024–Spring 2025) we are still using the Classical Piano Syllabus Manual dated 2016. This current Manual is kept up-to-date on the Syllabus Page of the website under "Syllabus Manuals and Rep Lists" (members must sign in to access this page). Check that you are using the correct version, including the Introduction, which has so much valuable information and can answer a lot of your questions!

#### Repertoire Changes

The Syllabus Repertoire committee is recommending that OMTA drop the word "idiom" from the requirement for Contemporary Era music. Instead, the word "contrasting" will be used to describe the recommended repertoire for all levels of Syllabus. This will allow a broader selection of late 20th century and living composers in Syllabus exams. This change will take effect in Fall 2025, when the next edition of the OMTA Classical Piano Syllabus Manual replaces our current edition. Current requirements for eras will remain the same in both Lower Division and Upper Division.

Happy November from the Central Oregon District!


