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

CONFERENCE ARTISTS



Giorgi and Anna Latso

THE LATSOS Piano Duo, recent winner of the Beverly Hills National Auditions, has been praised for its "brilliance and stylistic insight" by Los Angeles Weekly. The duo was enthusiastically formed in 2014 by pianists Giorgi Latso and Anna Fedorova-Latso. Since then they have showcased a true passion, deep maturity and sensitivity in their interpretations. The Latsos are a favorite among many concert organizers and promoters with the Internationale Chopin-Gesellschaft calling their performances "thrilling and flamboyant" and the MTNA Society hails their "intelligence, liveliness and enormous charm."

The duo performs at concert halls across Europe, America and Asia including The Music Center and Marquis Theater in Los Angeles, LACMA, Turgenev Art Gallery in Moscow, Yamaha Center in Bangkok, Imperial Marmorsaal Concert hall, Ehrbarsaal in Vienna, Linzer Stadthalle, after which the Oberösterreichische Nachrichten hailed them for being "as expressive as they are technically perfect." Recent festivals include Chopin Music Festival, International Classical Concerts in Rancho Mirage, Schubertiade Music Festival, the Osterfestival Tirol, the Aspen Music Festival, the Ruhr Piano Festival, Steinway Festival, etc. Moreover, the duo has been recently invited by legendary pianist Maria João Pires to perform at the Belgais Center for Arts in Portugal.

The Latsos have performed and recorded a number of unusual and largely unknown treasures from the duo-piano repertoire, including all the Schubert duets and duos. "The Latsos shine in enchantingly intimate dialogue and impress with their expression of emotional unrest" as German Kreiszeitung describes them. The Latsos are often guests on radio shows such as K-USC Radio, "Classic FM" Sunday Live, NDR Kultur, America Matters, KCKQ-AM 1180 and many more. One of their recent concert presentations held at the historic Doheny Estate & Gardens as part of the Music in the Mansion Series was filmed by Beverly Hills Warner Cable Television and live-streamed worldwide on BHTV10 Channel. They have also arranged for two pianos and four-hands transcriptions from selected American movie scores by the celebrated composers such as John Williams, Erich Wolfgang Korngold, John Sousa, etc. and have been hailed as "one of the finest transcribers of our time" in the European press.

Giorgi and Anna Latso combine performance and teaching. As music educators, they have presented master classes and lectures at a number of universities in Europe, Russia, Asia, as well as across the United States and are regularly invited to perform at prestigious music halls and scholarly conferences worldwide as well as serving as judges at various international, national, and regional piano competitions.

CONFERENCE PRESENTER



Kevin Olson

Kevin Olson is an active pianist, composer, and piano area coordinator at Utah State University, where he has taught courses in piano literature, pedagogy, accompanying, and music theory. In addition to his collegiate teaching responsibilities, Kevin directs the piano program at Utah State University, and oversees the Utah State University Youth Conservatory, which provides weekly group and private piano instruction to more than 200 pre-college community students. The National Association of Schools of Music has recently recognized the Conservatory as a model for pre-college piano instruction programs. Before teaching at Utah State, he was on the faculty at Elmhurst College near Chicago and Humboldt State University in northern California.

A native of Utah, Kevin began composing at age five. When he was twelve, his composition, An American Trainride. received the Overall First Prize at the 1983 National PTA Convention at Albuquerque, New Mexico. Since then, he has been a Composer in Residence at the National Conference on Keyboard Pedagogy, and has written music commissioned and performed by groups such as the Five Browns, American Piano Quartet5, Chicago a cappella, the Rich Matteson Jazz Festival, Music Teachers National Association, American Festival Chorus & Orchestra, the Festival for Creative Pianists, and several piano teacher associations around the country.

He gives workshops and performances nationally and internationally, most recently in India, China, Canada, and Great Britain.

Kevin maintains a large piano studio, teaching students of a variety of ages and abilities. Many of the needs of his own piano students have inspired over 200 books and solos published by the FJH Music Company, which he joined as a writer in 1994.

Matt Cooper is a Professor Emeritus of Music at Eastern Oregon University, where he was awarded the 2019 Distinguished Teaching Faculty award, retiring after a 31-year college teaching career. He served as OMTA President from 2000 to 2002, during which time he traveled to Khabarovsk, Russia as part of the "Music Without Borders" exchange program, leading to two additional invitations to perform in Khabarovsk in 2002 and 2004.



Dr. Cooper earned his Doctor of Musical Arts degree at the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music. He has done extensive study in the Taubman approach at the Golandsky Institute and Princeton University, and has studied Tango music in Buenos Aires. A former prizewinner in the Thelonious Monk and Great American Jazz Piano competitions, he is the author of Duke Ellington: A Study in Styles.

Dr. Cooper has adjudicated many piano festivals and competitions and has performed numerous solo recitals, chamber recitals, and concerto appearances throughout the Northwest. He has recorded eight jazz and classical CDs and is in frequent demand throughout the Northwest as a performer, adjudicator, clinician and presenter.

Nellie Tholen Excellence in Teaching Award

This award is named for Nellie Tholen, a professor of music and piano at Lewis and Clark College and an avid supporter of OMTA. A leading music pedagogue, who taught and inspired her own students with great skill and passion, she encouraged and supported teachers to become great themselves. Nellie Tholen's generous support of music throughout Oregon and her unstinting commitment to the improvement of music teaching has had an enduring influence on the quality of music and music education in the region.

She is founder and former chair of OMTA's Extended Study of Musicianship and Repertoire (ESMAR) and serves as an adjudicator for OMTA Syllabus. Past President of Cascadia Composers, she remains on the board and is chair of Cascadia Composer's annual In Good Hands Student Concert.



HISTORY OF OMTA

In 1913, the Superintendent of Oregon Public Education began the process of establishing music in the public schools and the accreditation of teachers for that purpose. It soon became apparent that some organization was needed, so in 1915, with the cooperation of the Musicians Club of Portland, delegates from throughout the state drew up the incorporation papers for the Oregon State Music Teachers Association. John Claire Monteith was elected president at the first annual Conference, November 30, 1916. A year later the name was shortened to the Oregon Music Teachers Association.

In 1927, the University of Oregon was asked to draw up standards for teacher accreditation, and the first Syllabus Bulletins began in 1928. A major revision in 1955 defined Syllabus as "a program of study for teachers of music to be used with pupils studying music outside of school for high school credit." Unfortunately, the Attorney General of Oregon ruled in 1959 that "such certification (of teachers) while it is not illegal was extra legal and outside the law." After this ruling, OMTA continued to expand its Syllabus program and develop its own merit plan of certification. OMTA Certification as we know it today was put into operation in 1963.

Through the years, many other projects have been undertaken by the organization. During the Depression a Sickness and Distress Fund was established to help members. Later, these funds were converted for use in providing student scholarships. Other funds have been contributed, and there are now a great number of scholarships and grants available for students and teachers.

Between 1981 and 1986, Nellie Tholen contributed \$50,000 to OMTA, with interest from the amount to be used for a Teacher Improvement Fund.

A Baroque Festival, Ensemble Festival, Student Composition Festival, Sonatina Festival, and Extended Study of Musicianship and Repertoire (ESMAR) have joined the OMTA Syllabus program, giving students added opportunities for performance and evaluation.

Nellie Tholen also made a significant contribution to the Oregon Community Foundation, to further the art of piano teaching in Oregon. Generous grants from this

trust have helped fund our OMTA State Conference for many years, making the conference affordable for all our members through travel grants, free student and new member registrations, and housing rebates. In addition, in 2014 OMTA was awarded a five year grant to provide continuing education programs across the state and to bring more continuing education opportunities to OMTA's rural and under served local districts.


The official publication of OMTA is Music News which is published bi-monthly from September through May. Additional information and communication is offered through the bi-annual Oregon Musician journal and the OMTA website. Annual conferences are well attended and provide members an opportunity for networking and continued professional growth. OMTA is divided into 14 districts which hold local meetings, workshops, and recitals to benefit members, their students, and their communities.

In 1950, OMTA affiliated with Music Teachers National Association and has since benefited through participation in its various programs for teachers and students, such as group insurance, national certification, the Independent Music Teachers' Forum, national courses of study, the American Music Teacher publication, student performance and composition competitions, and the Composer of the Year commissioning program.

In 1976, the History Books of OMTA were placed in the Oregon Historical Society building on Park Avenue in Portland. Members may arrange to see them by appointment. Also on file are memory books from some OMTA districts.

In 1997, OMTA was classified a non-profit, 501(c)(3), corporation.

In 2016, OMTA was chosen as the MTNA State Affiliate of the Year in recognition of our work towards inclusiveness, support, and continuing education of our member teachers. A suite by composer Kenji Bunch was commissioned to commemorate the honor and was premiered at the joint 2018 OMTA State Conference with Washington State Music Teachers Association.





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
